Dream Big

Last year, the Christian Leadership Development program in Southern Zambia hosted our team for a Survival Gardening workshop. The Christian Leadership Development program is a one year pre-college study program at George Benson Christian College. The goal of this particular workshop was to provide hunger-fighting knowledge and skills that the students will then use as teachers and preachers to empower people to reduce hunger and malnutrition within their communities. During the seven day training, students learned to make compost piles and manure tea. They also constructed drip irrigated raised planting beds. The students expressed excitement about using what they learned to make a difference by training others.

Several months later, there was a follow-up visit and garden maintenance training with the

Christian Leadership Development program. During this visit, 18-year-old trainee and student, Pawel Sitimeli (pictured above), said, "In the workshop, we were taught that the most important job of a farmer is to feed the soil using compost. From the first crop that we have planted here at school on the raised beds —if replicated in every village — I am convinced that Africa can eradicate hunger in less than ten years' time."

This story reminds us of why we do what we do. Sometimes aid comes in first to get past a crisis, but the main goal of HHI's mission is to aid, equip and empower. Thank you for instilling confidence and determination in the minds of men. women and children around the world. This is what makes change possible for generations to come!

Bridges Built

Victor Oyong is HHI's country coordinator in Nigeria, and he works with both the Hunger to Harvest and Clean Water ministries. Nigeria has a large Muslim population, and Victor's work is continually building bridges between the local Muslim and Christian communities.

Earlier this year, Victor coordinated the drilling of several water wells — one of which is located at the Kabusa Church of Christ. Kabusa is located on the outskirts of the capital city of Abuja, and does not have a consistent water supply. This creates hardship on everyone in the community. The local preacher, Ezekiel, said that with access to water, the church will be able to install a baptistry and plaster the walls of the building. All of these things increase the congregation's ability to evangelize, which is important as the building is located close to a Muslim prayer ground.

Another well was drilled at the local CRD Church of Christ, and this community also consists of both Christians and Muslims. Affiong Donatus (pictured below) lives in the Lugbe community with her husband and two children. She and her family are members of the CRD Church Of Christ and run a laundry business. Affiong says this well is "like a dream" and will greatly impact both her health and business. The lack of water in her community made it difficult to run her business, and right before this well was drilled, she was considering closing her shop. Affiong shared that many of the children in the village were regularly sick from drinking the contaminated water.

The clean water ministry is doing so much more than providing clean water — it's creating opportunities for Christians to meet their neighbors, meet a physical need for them, and create an opportunity to meet a spiritual need as well!





Widlord's Story

"I grew up in Haiti, where my family did not have the luxury of turning on a faucet at home to get water. At the age of five, I would walk for miles with my parents to a spring to get water. I had the responsibility of carrying a gallon of water back home. My mom would carry a bucket older I learned all of of five gallons on her head and one gallon in each hand. As I got older, I graduated from one gallon to one gallon in each hand.

I moved to Son-Light Children's home when I was 11, and we had the blessing of running water in our kitchen. This meant that my sisters had to master my mother's skill since they did not get the privilege that I got. However, Healing Hands drilled a well at the Ganthier Church of Christ, which is about 0.25 miles from where my family lived, and it was a blessing to them. (It continues to be a blessing today!) I drank out of that well many times.

Clean water is a need, but many people in Haiti do not have access to it. Kids end up sick, and many die. Growing up, my sisters and I

had worms in our stomachs and rashes on our bodies. At the time, I didn't know any better, but as I got this happened because of the unsafe water we drank and used to shower.

My congregation, Northside Church of Christ, decided to host a Walk4Water because they became more aware of the need. I was able to share with

them my story and the work that Healing Hands Submitted by: is doing to provide clean water for people in Haiti and around the world. They became very passionate about it because they heard about it from someone who has experienced drinking dirty water."

Not Too Far

The women from Bikita South believed they were too far away. They live in an extremely rural part of Zimbabwe and said they never dreamed they would be seen by a partner who could help them get their hopes off the ground.

But God brought us close.

Thanks to our Zimbabwe field team, John and Ngonidzashe, two groups of women were able to organize, construct business plans, build budgets, and start saving.

We first partnered with 11 people in the Rudo Peanut Butter Group, which means the Love Group. The Rudo Group saved a portion of their operating costs, then went through training on how to shell, roast, grind, and sell peanut butter. They were encouraged by the training and excited to launch their business. which is already generating enough income to steadily progress.

We then partnered with 15 people in the Kupfumaishungu Bakery, which means "you must persevere to succeed." After they too saved a portion of their operating costs, we partnered with them to provide an oven and training for the women involved. The training drew quite a crowd including several government officials and community leaders who expressed gratitude for the partnership with Healing Hands. At the training, the women learned how to make different breads and pastries, how to handle conflict, how to encourage one another, and how to glorify God in their work. This group is already profiting from their work selling hundreds of buns each day, and they are motivated to continue blessing their community.

We are so thankful that neither height nor depth, nor distance nor culture, nor anything else in all creation can separate us from the love of God that connects us to these remarkable women who are bringing hope to their communities around the world.





Sewing Ladies Can't Be Stopped

Somewhere around the world, 1,000 little girls will have a new dress, thanks to Ruth Mitchell of Mineola, TX! Ruth started sewing dresses almost two years ago and recently passed the 1,000 dress mark — and she's not stopping there! Ruth recalls when she was a little girl going to visit her aunt in the summers and how excited she would get over having new dresses made from flour and feed sacks. She said, "I know what it is to be excited about something new." Her mother was widowed and raised her children alone. "We grew up poor," she said. "We saved everything." All 1,200 dresses hand-made by Ruth will have come from her own fabric collection! These dresses are distributed to countries around the world, and many of them end up in HHI MAGI boxes. HHI could not do the work that it does without the support of our amazing volunteers!


Meet Peter Menza

When Peter was just an infant, he contracted Polio. As a result, he has never been able to walk, run, jump, or play like other children. He had no choice but to drop out of school when his parents could no longer afford to pay the fees, but the government provided tailoring training for Peter. For his entire life, Peter has either crawled or used his 3-wheel hand pedal cart to get around.

One day, Peter attended an HHI Survival Gardening workshop, and he proved to those at the workshop that his disability was not an inability. Peter went home and completed a raised planting bed! HHI Trainer, Augustus Kimanzi, recognized Peter's determination and shared his needs for a sewing machine and a 3-wheel motorcycle with the HHI Director of Hunger to Harvest.

Through partnerships with Central Illinois Rotary clubs, Peter received a new sewing machine with hand controls and a 3-wheel motorcycle. His response: "Kindness is the language that deaf can hear, the blind can see and the disabled can feel. I am a firm believer that God created us with two hands, one to help ourselves and the other for helping others."

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Relief in India

Our team continues to be amazed at the ways in which God is using your resources to directly impact lives through our friends in India. While our hearts still hurt as we hear the tragic stories and take in the devastating images, we remain confident that our Father will continue to connect us with the right people at the right time to provide relief.

Your generosity has funded 41 oxygen concentrators, 3571 food bags for families unable to work, 203 individuals had their hospitalization fees covered, and 540 individuals were provided the necessary medical supplies at home to avoid going back to the hospital. Many of the food bags have been delivered to leper families who would normally beg, but they cannot at this time due to the guarantine. As usual, the poorest of the poor suffer the most as they have no safety net to lean on, no savings, no pantry—so if they don't work or beg—they don't eat.

Our team will continue to provide updates from our friends in India as we receive them. On behalf of all those whose lives are being impacted by your resources, thank you!
